

International scholars visit Taiping Island

A group of experts on international law and political science from Taiwan and abroad toured Taiping Island in the ROC's Nansha (Spratly) Islands (15 April) to gain a better understanding of the island's conditions.

The visit, at the invitation of the ROC government, came a day after the scholars had taken part in the International Conference on South China Sea Disputes and International Law at Soochow University in Taipei, where they were addressed by President Ma Ying-jeou.

After conducting a survey of the island's infrastructure, natural resources and vegetation, the scholars were provided with lunch prepared from locally resourced ingre-

dients. Staff also demonstrated how the natural resources on Taiping Island are sufficient to sustain human habitation.

The Scholars toured the island's wharf, lighthouse, solar power system, and hospital, all of which were constructed for humanitarian purposes.

Following the inspection, the ROC government reiterated that Taiping Island can sustain human habitation and an economic life of its own, thus meeting the criteria of an island as defined in Article 121 of UNCLOS.

Academics from the United
States, the United Kingdom, the
Netherlands, Indonesia, Greece and
Austria were present on the trip.

Taiwan and UK sign prisoners transfer agreement

Taiwan and the United Kingdom have signed an agreement enabling the transfer of prisoners between the two sides, the second such agreement between Taiwan and a European country. The agreement took effect immediately after its signing was completed on 3 May.

Under the terms of the agreement, British prisoners in Taiwan and Taiwanese prisoners held in the UK can apply for transfers to prisons closer to their homes to complete their sentences, making it easier for their families to visit more regularly.

There are currently seven British nationals serving jail terms in Taiwan, while one Taiwanese prisoner is being held in the UK.

The signing of the agreement on prisoner transfers followed a similar pact signed between Taiwan and Germany in November 2013.

Taiwan and the UK reached a consensus on the content of the agreement back in January, following negotiations of more than one year.

Tai Tung-li, Deputy-Director of the Justice Ministry's Department of International and Cross-Strait Legal Affairs, signed the agreement on 15 April on behalf of the government of Taiwan, along with Digby Griffith, director of National Operational Services at the UK's National Offender Management Service.

Cloud Gate heads to London and Birmingham

Taiwan's most acclaimed dance troupe is performing their masterpiece 'Songs of the Wanderers' in London and Birmingham from 4-11 May. Established in the early 1970s, the tour will be the group's last in the United Kingdom, due to the retirement of the group's founder and artistic director Mr Lin Hwai-min.

Songs of the Wanderers is One of Cloud Gate's earliest productions to gain international recognition; taking inspiration from the religious rites and spiritual philosophy found in Asia.

The 90-minute production has been described as both captivating and unique, with meticulous choreography. Golden rice grains shower down on dancers – some in motion, others unmoving – and pile up on stage to form hills, deserts, rivers.

Alistair Spalding, artistic director of Sadler's Wells, also held a public discourse with the Cloud Gate founder in a post-show talk on 4th May.

Cloud Gate will then travel north to join the International Dance Festival in Birmingham, where two further renditions of Songs of the Wanderers will be staged at the Birmingham Hippodrome before the troupe departs for Russia, where they will perform in Saint Petersburg, Moscow, and Yekaterinburg.
